Annotatsiya: Ushbu maqolada axborot urushi va zamonaviy diplomatiya o'rtasidagi o'zaro bog'liqlik globallashtirish, raqamli transformatsiya va geosiyosiy raqobat sharoitida tahlil qilinadi. Bugungi xalqaro munosabatlarda kuch faqat harbiy yoki iqtisodiy imkoniyatlar bilan emas, balki axborotni boshqarish, narrativ yaratish va raqamli ta'sir orqali ham belgilanmoqda. Axborot urushi davlatlar va nodavlat subyektlar tomonidan raqibga ta'sir qilish, jamoatchilik fikrini shakllantirish va siyosiy maqsadlarga erishish vositasi sifatida keng qo'llanilmoqda.
