

ANALYSIS OF THE CURRENT SITUATION OF HISTORICAL CULTURAL RELICS PROTECTION IN UZBEKISTAN

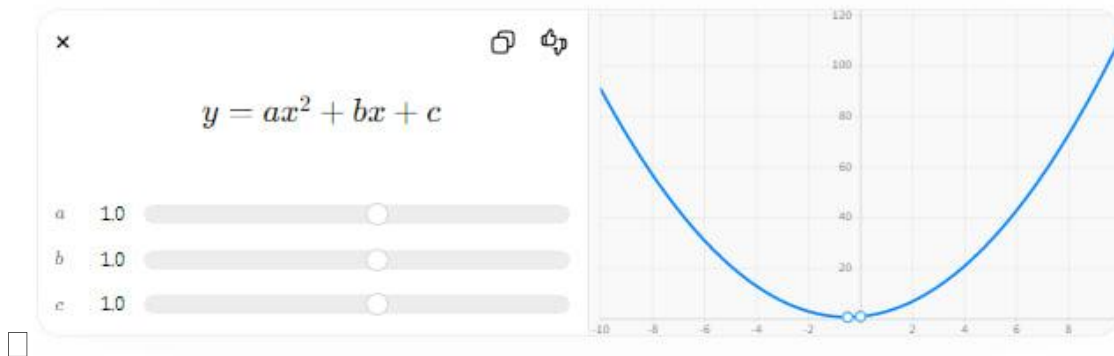
Some tourist areas have experienced excessive commercialization, which affects the authenticity of the historical and cultural environment.
