Survey on Idiom Awareness

- Hit the nail on the head (To describe something accurately) 2.
- Spill the beans (To reveal a secret) 3.
- Under the weather (To feel unwell) 4.
- A piece of cake (Something very easy to do) 5.

Survey Results

8 out of 10 students recognized "A piece of cake" and "Break the ice."

6 out of 10 were familiar with "Hit the nail on the head."

5 out of 10 had heard of "Spill the beans."

4 out of 10 knew the meaning of "Under the weather."

These findings suggest that while some idioms are well-known; others are less familiar to learners. This highlights the need for targeted instruction to improve idiomatic knowledge and usage.

Findings and Solutions

From the survey results and research, the following key findings emerge:

1. Common idioms are easier to recognize, but metaphorical idioms pose challenges.

Solution: Use contextualized learning strategies, such as incorporating idioms into conversations, storytelling, and multimedia resources.

2. Digital media plays a crucial role in idiom exposure.

Solution: Encourage students to consume content in English, such as movies, podcasts, and blogs, to reinforce their understanding.

3. Idioms vary based on cultural and regional differences.

Solution: Language programs should include diverse idiomatic expressions and explain regional differences to enhance global communication skills.

4. Many learners struggle with the figurative meanings of idioms.

Solution: Educators should use imagery, mnemonic devices, and idiom-based games to facilitate better comprehension.

The use of idiomatic expressions significantly enhances fluency and natural speech. Incorporating idioms into language learning not only improves comprehension but also strengthens social interactions. While challenges exist in understanding figurative language, structured teaching methods, digital tools, and immersive
