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### **Annotatsiya**

### **Tim Fulford, Wordsworth's Poetry**

This study highlights the importance of “historical issues and events” as well as the concept of historicity, showing how they are reflected in the form, style, genre, and prosody of Wordsworth's later poetry. Fulford's detailed analysis of Wordsworth's engagement with historical discourse and his concern with socio-political realities challenges the New Historicist view that the poet avoids history. By focusing on “historical particularities and ideological conflicts” as driving forces within Wordsworth's work, Fulford interprets nature as shaped by a turbulent past, revealing social injustice and political complexity. Literature itself is treated as a historical force, reflecting Wordsworth's evolving perspectives on political and religious history.

Wordsworth's innovations in genre contribute to redefining tradition and memory, allowing his poetry to intervene in historical understanding. In Part I, Fulford examines the material conditions surrounding the production of monuments, as well as the paradoxical "material immateriality" of the Coleorton inscriptions. In Part II, attention is given to Wordsworth's tourist memorials, which are understood as physical traces of Scottish nationalism and struggles for independence. Drawing on recent research in book history and manuscript culture, Fulford explores how poetic memory is constructed through the writing practices of the Wordsworth household, presenting memory as a process of textual reconstruction and reassembly. In Part IV, the sonnet and sonnet sequence are analyzed as historical forms that express spirituality shaped by tradition and religious institutions. In this context, Wordsworth's church sonnets are interpreted as a means of bringing the past into the present, while also demonstrating the poet's commitment to traditional poetic forms.

Seeking to present a more comprehensive view of Wordsworth, Fulford portrays him not only as a poet deeply engaged with history—particularly war and its psychological impact—but also as a poet of imagination, national identity, compassion, and critical reflection. Wordsworth is shown as a writer who affirms human dignity and individuality without promoting revolutionary action. Ultimately, Fulford characterizes Wordsworth as a dynamic and evolving poet who continually reshapes his earlier poetic identity in response to changing personal and social contexts.

In Part I, Wordsworth's apparent detachment from rural and cultural politics in *Poems of 1815* is interpreted as a deliberate strategy aimed at managing his public image and addressing anxieties about reception and authorship. For example, the removal of references to William Cowper and the reclassification of "Yew Trees" among the "Poems of the Imagination" are seen as efforts to reposition himself within the literary marketplace. Additionally, Wordsworth's aesthetic treatment of landscape and his use of neoclassical inscription are viewed as attempts to redefine his relationship with his patron, George Beaumont.

Part II focuses on Wordsworth's restrained and objective approach to history, highlighting his effort to make poetry an effective medium for commemoration. Fulford examines Wordsworth's engagement with Scottish culture, particularly through his recognition of Robert Burns, as well as his differentiation from figures such as James Macpherson, Walter Scott, and James Hogg. These choices are interpreted as conscious attempts to avoid idealizing colonial history and to address its associated violence more critically.

### **Research Methodology**

This study employs a qualitative research approach to investigate the expression of Romanticism in Wordsworth's poetry. The methodology includes:
