### Psychological basis:

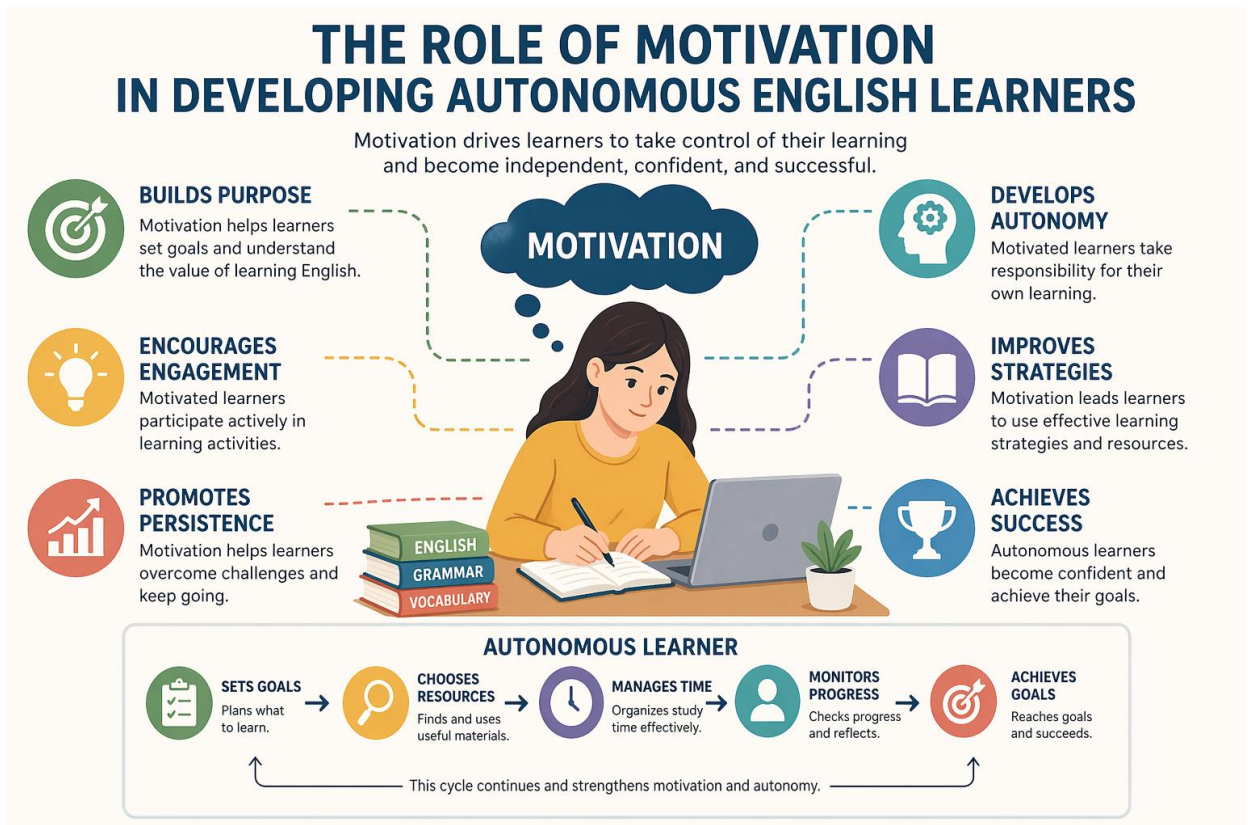
- **Metacognitive theory:** Learners enhance their effectiveness by planning, monitoring, and evaluating their own learning strategies.
