

## THE MIRACLE OF A NEW GENERATION: THE YOUTH WHO CHANGED UZBEKISTAN'S FOOTBALL

Every movement and every pass he makes on the pitch is directed at a certain logic and a specific goal. Abbas does not believe in coincidence. If the ball is passed to a certain point — there is a reason for it. He looks for space, consistently studies the opponent's weak spot, and strikes a painful blow. All these young men united as one whole mechanism, one family. Their goal was not just to leave a name, but to leave an indelible mark on the history of Uzbek football, and they succeeded.

The decisive matches of the qualifying round pinned the entire country in front of screens and at the stadiums. The atmosphere was different that day. It was not just a battle of tactics and techniques on the pitch, but a war of characters and a clash of wills. The opponents tried to break us and forcefully impose their nervous game.
