Greetings

Zdravstvuyte! (Здравствуйте!) — Hello! (A formal greeting used in most situations, such as meeting strangers or in stores.)

Kak dela? (Как дела?) — How are you? (A common question after a greeting; in formal settings, use "Kak vashi dela?")

Do svidaniya! (До свидания!) — Goodbye! (A formal way to say goodbye.)

Poka! (Пока!) — Bye! (A more informal way to say goodbye.)

Note: It is important to remember that in Russian, there are two ways of addressing people: "vy" (formal) and "ty" (informal). For example, "Zdravstvuyte!" is a formal greeting, and it is better to use "vy" when addressing strangers.

Requests and Asking for Help

Izvinite, gde nakhoditsya tualet? (Извините, где находится туалет?) — Excuse me, where is the toilet?

Kak proyti k ...? (Как пройти к ...?) — How do I get to ...? (e.g., Kak proyti k metro? — How do I get to the metro?)

Mozhete pomoch' mne? (Можете помочь мне?) — Can you help me?

Izvinite, ya ne govoryu po-russki. (Извините, я не говорю по-русски.) — Sorry, I don't speak Russian.

At the Hotel and Train Station

U menya bron' na imya ... (У меня бронь на имя ...) — I have a reservation for

Skol'ko stoit noch'? (Сколько стоит ночь?) — How much is a night?

Kogda registratsiya v otele? (Когда регистрация в отеле?) — What time is check-in?

Yest' li v vashem otele Wi-Fi? (Есть ли в вашем отеле Wi-Fi?) — Do you have Wi-Fi in your hotel?

Gde nakhoditsya blizhayshaya apteka? (Где находится ближайшая аптека?) — Where is the nearest pharmacy?

Gde nakhoditsya kassa? (Где находится касса?) — Where is the ticket office?

Kak dobrat'sya do tsentra goroda? (Как добраться до центра города?) — How do I get to the city center?

Kogda sleduyushchiy poyezd? (Когда следующий поезд?) — When is the next train?

At the Restaurant

Mozhno menyu, pozhaluysta? (Можно меню, пожалуйста?) — Can I have the menu, please?

Chto vy porekomenduete? (Что вы порекомендуете?) — What do you recommend?

Ya vegetarianets. Yest' li u vas blyuda bez myasa? (Я вегетарианец. Есть ли у вас блюда без мяса?) — I am a vegetarian. Do you have any dishes without meat?

Mozhno bez soli? (Можно без соли?) — Can I have it without salt?

Schyot, pozhaluysta. (Счёт, пожалуйста.) — The bill, please.

Emergency Situations

Pozvonite v politsiyu! (Позвоните в полицию!) — Call the police!

Ya poteryalsya. Gde ya? (Я потерялся. Где я?) — I'm lost. Where am I?

Mne nuzhno v bol'nitsu. (Мне нужно в больницу.) — I need to go to the hospital.

Ya poteryal pasport. Chto mne delat'? (Я потерял паспорт. Что мне делать?) — I lost my passport. What should I do?

Shopping and Transportation

Skol'ko stoit eto? (Сколько стоит это?) — How much does this cost?

Mozhno oplatit' kartoy? (Можно оплатить картой?) — Can I pay by card?

Gde blizhayshiy magazin? (Где ближайший магазин?) — Where is the nearest shop?

Vy mozhete govorit' medlenno? (Вы можете говорить медленно?) — Can you speak slowly?

Gde ya mogu kupit' sim-kartu dlya telefona? (Где я могу купить сим-карту для телефона?) — Where can I buy a SIM card for my phone?

Kak proyti k avtobusnoy ostanovke? (Как пройти к автобусной остановке?) — How do I get to the bus stop?

Gde nakhoditsya etot adres? (Где находится этот адрес?) — Where is this address?

Est' li v etom rayone metro? (Есть ли в этом районе метро?) — Is there a metro in this area?

Vo skol'ko ukhodit posledniy avtobus? (Во сколько уходит последний автобус?) — What time does the last bus leave?

Kak dobrat'sya do aeroport? (Как добраться до аэропорта?) — How do I get to the airport?

Food and Drinks

Mozhno zakazat' stolik na dvoikh? (Можно заказать столик на двоих?) — Can I reserve a table for two?

U vas yest' chto-to bez glyutena? (У вас есть что-то без глютена?) — Do you have anything gluten-free?

Ya ne yem myaso. Mozhno li prigotovit' blyudo bez myasa? (Я не ем мясо. Можно ли приготовить блюдо без мяса?) — I don't eat meat. Can you make it without meat?

Mozhno bez pertza? (Можно без перца?) — Can I have it without pepper?

Voda bez gaza, pozhaluysta. (Вода без газа, пожалуйста.) — Still water, please.
